SUMMARY

Dr Gabriella M. Romano is an independent historian and a documentary writer/director. Her field of research is the history of sexuality and homosexuality in Italy, focussing on the fascist period (1922 – 1943), and women's history. On these two broad topics, she has published books and essays mainly based on her oral history and archive research, and she has written, produced and directed several documentaries. She has taught at Temple University Rome, Richmond University Rome, West Surrey College of Arts and Design, Farnham, Birkbeck College, London, and the University of Turin, where she held tow one-off sessions within the History of Homosexuality course.

Her other main interests are cinema, media and the performing arts. She has consolidated experience working as a journalist too. She started her career as a music and theatre journalist for radio, magazines and daily newspapers and, when in London, she worked as a researcher for independent television companies and for several broadcasters.

In April 2022, she was awarded a Research Grant by the Gerda Henkel Foundation to continue her archive research on the repression of sexuality through psychiatric internment in Southern Italy. She is Honorary Research Fellow at Birkbeck College, University of London.
